Dear Members of the 116th Congress,

Like all other American institutions, America's leading research universities are suffering unprecedented financial strain and uncertainty due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The nurses, doctors, scientists, faculty, students, and researchers at our institutions are working night and day to treat the ill; develop new tests, treatments, cures, and vaccines; and gather and disseminate critical information and data for use by the government and the public. The pandemic has caused significant and substantial strain on research universities and hospitals, even as these same institutions fight on the front lines of this pandemic. Our nation's ability to fight this pandemic is directly tied to the ability of our institutions, staff, and students to stay in the fight.

Federal support for our research universities and students at this moment is vital to our nation's success both now and in the future. AAU estimates that the collective near-term financial impact of the pandemic to our 63 U.S. member universities is over \$8 billion. This figure will continue to grow if institutions are unable to resume close to normal on-campus operations this fall. AAU members are among the largest, if not the largest, employers in their cities and states, and the harmful economic consequences of the pandemic to these institutions is felt beyond their campuses. Americans from all walks of life are dependent on us for their wellbeing, from doctors and nurses to facility and food service professionals. I urge your consideration of <u>our recommendations</u> – developed with other university and research organizations – for significant relief for students, the research workforce, and the ability of research universities and hospitals to fight the pandemic and serve national interests.

Since the end of World War II, America's leading research universities have helped make our nation the world's leader in scientific and medical innovation. From the polio vaccine to the smartphone, our universities have made possible the world's greatest leaps in medicine and science in the last few decades. Across the globe, other nations envy the partnership that our institutions have with our government and private sector. Gifted students from around the world, across the United States, and from every walk of life and income level come to our universities to learn and grow into the medical professionals, engineers, innovators, and other leaders that our nation needs.
