Dear Secretary Nielsen:

I commend you for reestablishing the Homeland Security Academic Advisory Council (HSAAC) earlier this year. Since its formation in 2012, HSAAC has served as an important forum for discussion of homeland security and immigration issues between higher education community leaders and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). HSAAC meetings have addressed important issues involving international students, campus emergency preparedness, homeland security-related academic programs and research, faculty exchanges, and the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP). The ongoing opportunity for dialogue and engagement between DHS and the higher education community on pressing issues of common interest is of enormous value, and I ask that AAU and other major higher education organizations be reinstated to HSAAC.

As you may know, because of leadership retirements, some leading higher education associations, including AAU, are no longer listed as members. I respectfully urge you to renew AAU's membership, as well as that of the American Council on Education (ACE) and the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) in HSAAC. Together, our three organizations represent the vast majority of our nation's public and private research universities.

We are mindful of recent heightened security concerns regarding international students and researchers. We strongly believe that international students, scholars, and scientists contribute much to our country, and we will continue to do our part to ensure that our campuses and America are secure. Accordingly, higher education leaders have been engaged in a continuing dialogue with Congress and security and science agencies, including the FBI, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, the Departments of Defense and State, the National Institutes of Health, and the National Science Foundation.

We would welcome a conversation about these issues, as well as new rules and policies affecting higher education, including the accrual of unlawful presence and increases to student visa fees. In addition, the fall 2018 Unified Agenda regulatory plan indicates that DHS intends to issue proposed regulations on establishing a maximum period of authorized stay for F-1 visas. We hope HSAAC can provide a timely forum for us to engage in a meaningful and constructive dialogue with DHS on these issues of common interest.
