Sources to Monitor Relevant Litigation

AAU continues to monitor ongoing litigation relevant to our members and our key issues. Members and the public seeking more information on a particular case are encouraged to review one of the many available resources tracking legal challenges against the Trump Administration. This includes options such as the following:

- 1. <u>Civil Rights Litigation Clearinghouse</u>: Providing access to full case texts of litigation against the Trump Administration, users can locate specific cases by using the search bar, the "Ordered by" menu, or the advanced search section. Navigate between pages by using the arrows located at the bottom of the webpage. Each case page includes a summary of the case, the parties and counsel, as well as relevant documents from the docket.
- 2. Just Security: Just Security is an "editorially independent, non-partisan, daily digital law and policy journal" based at the NYU Law School Reiss Center on Law and Security. The page provides an interactive table tracking legal challenges to the Trump administration. Users can use the search bar to locate full case text for ongoing or closed cases. The filter menus allow users to search for cases by topic, executive action, case name or date filed. Case summaries and links to Court Listener are also provided.
- 3. <u>New York Times</u>: The NYT interactive article organizes ongoing lawsuits by issue such as "Budget freezes", "DOGE", or "Immigration". Each case entry includes a short summary, a link to the docket in Court Listener, and relevant NYT articles on the case. Users can quickly navigate to a section with the "Jump to a section" menu.
- 4. <u>Associated Press</u>: The AP tracker provides a comprehensive chart of lawsuits filed against President Trump's executive orders. Columns offer case names, brief summaries and the judges assigned to the case, with colors indicating which president appointed them. A color legend and interactive bar chart are provided at the top of the article for quick updates by issue and status. Users can quickly access sections using the "Jump to" menu.
- 5. <u>Washington Post</u>: The Washington Post tracker divides litigation by topic and status. A chart at the top of the article categorizes the status of key cases by their associated symbols and colors. Users can access the details of a lawsuit by browsing through the side-menu and clicking embedded links to related articles, if available.

As stated above, AAU will continue to monitor ongoing and future litigation against the Trump Administration and related to the interests and issues of our organization and members. We will also continue to provide updates where relevant.
